LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

YWCA Cambridge is located on the Haldimand Tract, land promised to the Haudenosaunee people of the Six Nations, which includes six miles on either side of the Grand River. This unceded territory is the traditional territory of the Neutral, Anishnaabeg and Haudenosaunee Peoples.

We acknowledge the rich histories and ways of knowing of the Indigenous peoples of these lands who lived on them and had their own governance structures and ways of knowing for thousands of years before European colonizers arrived. We acknowledge that colonization was a genocidal practice and that Indigenous peoples were not in need of "civilizing" by colonizers. We acknowledge that a part of colonization was murdering and displacing Indigenous peoples from their lands and their communities, from their languages and ways of knowing, from their families. We acknowledge the enduring richness of Indigenous cultures despite the colonial project, and we honour that resilience and power.

We commit to using this understanding to inform our work to ensure we do not perpetuate the harms of colonization and instead work to repair them. We commit to continuously investigating our policies, practices and our long history to come to terms with and acknowledge the harms we've participated in or even propagated, and to truly, intentionally and genuinely do the work of reconciliation. We commit to being a part of a society that creates a roadmap to reconciliation.

YWCA CAMBRIDGE IN THE NEWS





Since 2019, YWCA Cambridge has been partnered with YW Kitchener-Waterloo on a joint capacity-building and advocacy project called **The Feminist Shift**, funded by Women and Gender Equality Canada. Through this collaboration, we've produced countless opinion pieces published in local media, various podcast episodes on our Feminist Shift Podcast, hosted a number of public education events and joined with other local organizations to produce systems-changing research projects.

2022's key project was Project Willow, a joint initiative between YW Kitchener-Waterloo, The Coalition of Muslim Women KW and Community Justice **Initiatives.** The community-based research project spoke directly to women and gender diverse individuals with living or lived experience with homelessness and sought to understand their experiences with gender-based violence while being unhouse. The findings were startling. We hope this is only the beginning of addressing the intersecting crises of women's homelessness and gender-based violence in Waterloo Region.

PROJECT

At YWCA Cambridge, advocacy rooted in advancing gender and socio-economic equity is a core part of our work. Though we are a smaller organization, we continuously push the needle on social change through collaboration and coalition-building with other social justice organizations.

2022 was an incredible year for movement on gender equity in our community and more broadly across Canada.

In 2022, we:



Built on decades of feminist advocacy pushing for a **national child care plan** and finally saw this long-held dream come to fruition with the **Canada -Ontario child care agreement**;



Met with countless elected officials at all levels of government to **push for action on the workforce crisis facing the child care sector** and also to bring a **gendered lens to the housing and homelessness crisis**, particularly in Cambridge;



Led a successful **YWCA Ontario** provincial election campaign, **#ChooseGenderEquity**, which called for political candidates to commit to addressing systemic inequities growing along socio-economic, racial and gender lines;

Participated in a national **"Add the M"** campaign to improve equality in sports, highlighting the fact that women's sports always have the 'w' and men's sports are just called "sports";



Wrote countless letters and submissions to provincial and federal leaders on issues relating to child care, gender equity and budgets; and



Joined YWCAs from across Canada for our annual **Day on the Hill**, meeting federal ministers and senators to call for increased funding to address the **crisis of women's homelessness in Canada**.

Empowering Youth To Be the Change



Gender-based violence prevention, education and awareness is offered to youth of all genders ages 6+ through presentations and workshops available free to local schools, community-based programs and spaces throughout **Waterloo Region**. Facilitators create a **safer space** through the use of a participant-led model of programming. This model encourages youth to share and direct the learning through their participation, ensuring that conversations are relevant and include the lived experiences and identities of participants within the group. Workshops engage youth in **open dialogue** and activities that reflect real life scenarios in order to increase **awareness** and **critical thinking** around **gender-based violence** and its impacts, while **creating safer communities for all**.

Workshops can be offered as a series of conversations that build on the topics and concepts or as one-off workshops focusing on one theme or topic. Workshops include **gender and socialization**, **healthy relationships**, **consent** and **bystander intervention**. Through these workshops, participants are encouraged to form their own definitions, better understand what feels safe or unsafe within their relationships, push back against harmful stereotypes and learn how to safely respond when experiencing or witnessing violence.

In 2022, YWCA Cambridge's renowned TechGyrls program was taken national by YWCA Canada!

TechGyrls aims to improve the mental well-being, community connections, essential skills, access to technology and education outcomes for girls and gender diverse youth between the ages of 9 and 13 from communities across three provinces. YWCA Canada partnered with YWCA Cambridge, YWCA Hamilton, YWCA Niagara Region, YWCA Toronto, YWCA Moncton and YWCA St. John's to offer this unique program.

Take Back the Night

Thursday September 15 was our first in-person **Take Back the Night** rally and march in recognition of sexual and gender-based violence. This event aims to reconnect the community with the organizations working toward ending GBV and supporting those who have experienced and are healing from sexual and gender-based violence. The W welcomed community partners **Sanguen Health Services**, **Women's Crisis Services of Waterloo Region**, **Shelter Movers and OK2BME** and also highlighted the work of YWCA Cambridge partnerships with **Feminist Shift** and **Project Willow**. The event, including the rally and march, was hosted by a group of youth participants who bravely shared their voices, spoke to the need for safer space and led the community with chants throughout the march of downtown Cambridge.

Building Key skills and Better Futures For Women and Gender Diverse Individuals

2022 saw the launch of the The **Next Accelerator Project**. The Next Accelerator helps families access the Canada Learning Bond in order to start saving toward their child's education. This two-year project is funded by **Employment and Social Development Canada (ESDC)** and aims to increase awareness about the **Canada Learning Bond (CLB)** among modest income, fixed income, single parent and newcomer families across Canada. Its primary goal is to improve access to education and financial knowledge among families.

YWCA Cambridge, in partnership with **YWCA Canada**, also launched the **Dollars and Sense Program**, which, through various workshops and other programming, aims to improve financial literacy, reduce financial stress and address specific needs of participants.

Small Steps to Success

2022 brought different challenges from other pandemic years, but YWCA staff and community supporters stepped up and adapted to meet the changing needs of participants. Through our 12-week Small Steps To Success pre-employment and life skills program, we reached 24 women with programming and wraparound supports. Our **Women In Transition** program, which is open to all graduates of SSTS, continued offering opportunities for connection and fun, reaching 112 women.

Festive Futures

Festive Futures is about spreading holiday cheer to people often not included in community holiday giving programs: adult women. This year, the Festive Futures program was able to reach 25 women and raised a total of \$3805.00 for the purchase of gifts.

Breaking Down Gendered Barriers to Success

Uplift Reskilling and Upskilling

Through partnerships with post-secondary institutions such as the University of Guelph and McMaster University, the YWCA Uplift program provides women and gender diverse individuals the opportunity to reskill or upskill in advanced manufacturing or data science all while having access to additional supports related to navigating non-traditional workplaces and job development. Key highlights from Uplift, operated by six YWCAs across Ontario:

- 135+ graduates, all successful in finding gainful, relevant employment;
- 74% of graduates are new Canadians, arriving in the last five years;
- On average, we have seen a **\$29,284 increase in salaries** among participants in the YWCA Cambridge Uplift program alone;
- Participants reported a 98% increase in feeling more secure in their job, a 99% increase in feeling competent and confident in themselves to apply for jobs and a 96% increase in overall life satisfaction; and

It not only gave me the education and resources I need to succeed but the genuine care from staff at the Uplift Program and their constant effort to connect us with the Data Science community and job resources made this experience incredible....

Roots of Empathy is a world-renowned, evidence based social and emotional literacy program. At the heart of the program is a local family and their baby, our "tiny teacher." As the students witness the baby's emotional and physical milestones, they learn more about the baby and themselves. This program plays an integral role in helping students to express themselves and understand the perspectives of their classmates in a risk free learning environment. Research shows a decrease in aggression and an increase in co-operation and understanding others in host classrooms.




