

YWCA Cambridge is located on the Haldimand Tract, land promised to the Haudenosaunee people of the Six Nations, which includes six miles on either side of the Grand River. This unceded territory is the traditional territory of the Neutral, Anishnaabeg and Haudenosaunee Peoples.

We acknowledge the rich histories and ways of knowing of the Indigenous peoples of these lands who lived on them and had their own governance structures and ways of knowing for thousands of years before European colonizers arrived. We acknowledge that colonization was a genocidal practice and that Indigenous peoples were not in need of "civilizing" by colonizers. We acknowledge that a part of colonization was murdering and displacing Indigenous peoples from their lands and their communities, from their languages and ways of knowing, from their families. We acknowledge the enduring richness of Indigenous cultures despite the colonial project, and we honour that resilience and power.

We commit to using this understanding to inform our work to ensure we do not perpetuate the harms of colonization and instead work to repair them. We commit to continuously investigating our policies, practices and our long history to come to terms with and acknowledge the harms we've participated in or even propagated, and to truly, intentionally and genuinely do the work of reconciliation. We commit to being a part of a society that creates a roadmap to reconciliation.

Grace Bible Church stepped up as a temporary shelter. Regional Council believed in our vision and voted in favour of funding renovations and operating funding.

A defining moment of 2024 was the advancement of our mission to address women's **homelessness in Cambridge**. In October 2023, we published our research report, *Women's Homelessness in Cambridge: Knowledge Sharing and Interventions*, shedding light on the urgent need for dedicated services. This research, along with collaborative efforts, led to the establishment of **Cambridge's first women's emergency homeless shelter**. Located at Grace Bible Church, the shelter officially opened its doors on February 24, 2025, and is currently operating at full capacity, serving 20 women and gender-diverse individuals 24/7, with on-site physical and mental health support, as well as other supportive programming and services.



PROVIDING HIGH QUALITY CHILD CARE IN CAMBRIDGE FOR OVER 60 YEARS!

In 2024. we provided high quality, licensed child care to more than **450 children** in **five licensed child care centres** across Cambridge!

This year, we also entered into a unique partnership between the public and Catholic school boards to be the operator of **88 NEW child care spaces** at a school to be built in South Galt. The ground has been broken and we're looking forward to opening our **sixth** child care centre in **2026**! We know how important access to affordable child care is and that, while parent fees have reduced significantly as a result of the National child care plan, there are still too few spaces available to families needing them. We're proud to be a part of child care's expansion!



CREATING LASTING MEMORIES AND NEW FRIENDSHIPS

Our summer camp program for children provided a transformative experience for over 480 young campers this year. Our high-quality, affordable camp programming is guided by best practices in early learning and is High Five certified. Programming focuses on building self-esteem, fostering creativity, and encouraging teamwork.

Unique to our camps is an on-site behaviour and inclusion expert who works with parents right at registration to plan for any tailored needs of campers to ensure they have the best possible time at camp!

NEW CAMPS ADDED IN 2024

In 2024, in partnership with Wesley United Church, and in response to increased demand for camp spaces, we open a brand new summer camp program! Indoor summer camp at Wesley United (downtown Cambridge) is now offered each year and guarantees the same high quality care, loads of fun, and plenty of outside activity, too!







The W is a community-based program space, home to women's employment and financial literacy programs and various **youth** programs and camps, including SHYFT.

The W offers programming, builds community and hosts events that spreads awareness of genderbased violence and its impacts.

It's a space that requires safety in order to address biases, dismantle stereotypes and ensure the folks feel heard and valued.

This special space relies on successful grant writing, fundraising and donation to keep the space and programs accessible in the Cambridge community.

ADVANCING WOMEN'S EMPOWERMENT

Women's employment programming remains at the heart of our mission to empower women economically. We provided **job training**, **resume building**, **interview coaching**, **connection-making** opportunities and **lunch and learns**, to over **260 women** this year, with a focus on women facing barriers to employment, such as racial discrimination, caregiving responsibilities, and past experiences of violence.

FINANCIAL LITERACY PROGRAMMING

In partnership with YWCA Canada and member associations across Canada, YWCA Cambridge took part in two national projects aimed at providing economic empowerment through financial literacy training and education. The Dollars & Sense program and Next Accelerator Project provided more than 20 programs, reaching 230 women and gender-diverse individuals in 2024.

Next Accelerator helped families across Canada gain access to Canada Learning Bonds in order to start saving toward their children's futures. This project ended in 2024 reaching more than **480 families**.

The **Dollars & Sense** program continues to work closely with fixed/low income women and gender-diverse individuals, those leaving violent situations, racialized women and newcomers fostering a sense of financial confidence and empowerment. To date, the program has reached more than **700 participants**.

WOMEN'S EMPLOYMENT PROGRAMMING

UPLIFT RE/UPSKILLING

YWCA Cambridge's Uplift program provides women and gender-diverse individuals the opportunity to reskill or upskill in the specialized technology fields through certification training and additional supports related to job development and navigating traditionally male-dominated workplaces.

Participants gain certification training with a provincially recognized institution, tuition fees entirely covered by our program funder, FedDev Ontario. This program includes wraparound supports and programming such as career coaching, mock interviews and resume-building.

25 YEARS OF SMALL STEPS TO SUCCESS

2024 marked the 25th anniversary of our pre-employment and life skills program for women, Small Steps to Success!

Small Steps to Success is a 12-week holistic pre-employment and life skills program for women and gender-diverse individuals. This program, aimed at supporting women throughout the Region of Waterloo, provides the flexibility for participants to learn within a safe and supportive environment. Participants boost their confidence and skills, identify new strengths and goals, receive support in managing stress and budgets, and learn how to navigate interpersonal relationships in the workplace and beyond daily life.

This program provides foundational skills and support to help women overcome barriers and enter or re-enter the workforce. This program changes lives, and we know that because that's what our participants tell us!

YOUTH PROGRAMMING AT THE W

Our youth-focused programming continues to address the critical need for prevention and awareness around gender-based violence (GBV) in schools and communities. We provided education, resources, and workshops for over 1,827 youth this year through programming at The W and in the community, including in classrooms, focusing on consent, healthy relationships, and bystander intervention. We also continued building empathy among young children through our in-school Roots of Empathy programming.

SHYFT

SHAPING AND HELPING YOUTH FORM TOMORROW



SHYFT is offered in two formats: as a 12-week in-centre program and as a tailored in-school workshop. The program aims to develop increased **belonging**, **communication** and **problem solving skills**, while building **resilience** and **self-esteem/confidence**. It provides outlets for youth to engage in open dialogue and create their own social justice-based media-arts projects, encouraging change and awareness in their communities.

As an in-school program, SHYFT is open to all genders and builds on gender-based violence prevention topics, such as **healthy relationships**, **conflict resolution**, **consent** and **bystander intervention**, based on current research on promising practices and public education around equity and gender-based violence.

Why SHYFT? We asked our partners.

What motivated you to advocate for a group specifically for the girls in your neighbourhood?

"I noticed that there seemed to be a gap where there girls felt they were too old for some of the craft clubs and after school programs and not quiet old enough for our youth [programs] at the time and so I brought it the Recreation Coordinator...I really felt that it would be so beneficial to help them to see that they are seen and heard and that their voices matter and boost there confidence and self esteem."

In your opinion, why is it important for The W to continue operating in the Kinbridge space?

"Cause it takes a village to promote change in the community and what's a better partnership than to have a group of women supporting women and girls within our community - there's a power in that."

ROOTS OF EMPATHY

The 2024/2025 Roots of Empathy program welcomed four new accredited ROE instructors to our roster!

We offered **17 programs in 17 different schools**, across five school boards in Cambridge, Guelph, Kitchener, Waterloo, Fergus, Elmira, Orangeville and Linwood!

Roots of Empathy also has had the support of **17 partner families** with babies participating who were born between June and September 2024.

This incredible program is reaching approximately **500** students in the region this school year.




